GOSPEL REFLECTION

And immediately the man's ears were opened...

Today we continue to hear the Gospel of Mark proclaimed. In today's reading, Jesus heals a man who was deaf and had a speech impediment. This is a story about Jesus' healing power, and in it we find clues about our understanding of sacrament. We are struck by the physical means used to heal the man, the use of spittle and touch. The Church continues to celebrate the sacraments using physical means. In the Sacrament of Baptism, water and oil are used to show the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, we are anointed with holy oil on the forehead and the hands. In the Eucharist, bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ. We are a sacramental people who believe that God's grace is given to us through these physical signs.

The healing is one of the most 'physical' of all Jesus' miracles described in the Gospels. The man's condition places him at a great disadvantage as regards communication: he can neither receive verbal communication nor freely communicate his own thoughts, feelings and reflections to others. His condition is lonely and isolated. What Jesus does for this marginalized person is to bring him into the speaking and community hearing where interpersonal communication can truly flow through him. Despite this physical aspect, the healing is probably best interpreted symbolically. This is, of course, the case when the Ephphatha ritual is included in the liturgy of Christian Baptism. The celebrant touches the ears and mouth of the person being baptized and prays, 'May (the Lord Jesus) soon touch your ears to receive his word, and your mouth to proclaim his faith, to the praise and glory of God the Father'. In a symbolic sense, then, the man healed by Jesus represents all believers. Apart from the grace of God, we are 'deaf' to the Word of life spoken to us by the Creator. In the sacrament, Jesus gives us the capacity to hear the life-giving Word, which he then speaks to us in the Scriptures as proclaimed by the Church. Having heard that Word in the context of our own life experience, we then can turn to praise God and share what we have discovered with our fellow believers. Our ears are opened, and our tongues are 'loosened' for full participation in the community of faith. (Loyola Press / Brendan Byrne, SJ)

There will be a second collection for the Building Fund this weekend, September 7th and 8th.


