GOSPEL REFLECTION

"Be on your guard against all kinds of greed..."

We can put our trust in possessions, squabble over earthly inheritances, kid ourselves that what we have we deserve, store up treasures and think they'll afford us security and rest. All this is "vanity of vanities," a false and miserable way of living, as the writer of Ecclesiastes tells us.

This is the greed that Jesus warns against in this week's Gospel. The rich man's anxiety and toil expose his lack of faith in God's care and provision. Jesus calls the rich man a "fool"—a word used in the Old Testament for someone who rebels against God or has forgotten Him. And Paul calls greed "idolatry" in the Second Reading. Mistaking having for being, possession for existence, we forget that God is the giver of all that we have, and we exalt the things we can make or buy over our Maker.

If, as in Jesus' parable, you were cheated out of your inheritance by a sibling, how would you react? If a sibling were to do this, it would clearly be a sin and an injustice. But the more important question is your reaction to being cheated. Being cheated by another might result in one of two responses. The most common response is to immediately seek justice, to fight back. But this is not always what God will inspire us to do. Instead, when we experience injustice, we are given an opportunity to love on a very deep level. And this must be our response. This is why Jesus said we must love our enemies and pray for those who persecute us.

In the big picture of eternity, earthly injustices are always an opportunity for grace. This is evident by simply looking at the gravest injustice of the suffering and death of the Son of God. Jesus did not complain about being so cruelly treated. He did not call on the angels of Heaven to destroy the Pharisees and Romans who attacked Him. Instead, Jesus used the injustice inflicted upon Him as a foundation for His gift of salvation.

Everything in this world will one day pass away. In the light of that fact, recommit yourself to the embrace of God's riches by loving others through every injustice you encounter in life. (Excerpts from: Scott Hahn; My Catholic Life.)

Blessed Carlo Acutis

Carlo Acutis' awaited canonization as the first millennial saint is poised to occur on September 7, 2025. The Italian computer whiz, who famously developed a website documenting Eucharistic miracles before dying at age 15 in 2006 of leukemia, will officially join the sainthood alongside the late Italian Catholic activist Blessed Pier Giorgio Frassati (1901-1925). In recent months, Catholics and non-Catholics have learned more about Acutis from a book written by his parents, Andrea Acutis and Antonia Salzano. which also features writings from the late youth himself. "God's Influencer: Holy Advice by Carlo Acutis" chronicles how Carlo's faith journey and example ultimately brought his parents and others back to the Lord. The book also provides guidance from the soon-to-be St. Carlo on drawing closer to Jesus through the Eucharist, evangelizing the culture using modern media, and kindling spiritual progress in daily, practical ways.
